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COURSE DESCRIPTION

Syllabus Spring 2019: The primary objective of this course is to develop an understanding of observed human behavior. "Normal" and "abnormal" behaviors are reviewed through historical and cross-cultural perspectives culminating in the classification system outlined in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders-5 (DSM-5), which is the categorization adopted by most mental health professionals. Psycho-diagnostic methods and treatment approaches are examined within the course. These perspectives become the basis for addressing current social issues in mental health, such as involuntary commitment, group home alternatives for care, client-therapist confidentiality, and other pertinent topics.

COURSE FORMAT

This section of this course will be taught in an online format. Learning in the course is cumulative; in the early weeks, we'll develop skills you will need for more advanced projects. It's important that you plan for time-intensive work later in the semester.
